

2016 COUPN Awards Recognize Nurses, Students and Educators for Excellence in Nursing Education and Scholarship

TORONTO, April 20, 2016 – A nurse practitioner who works to improve the lives of young people with eating disorders, and a professor who counsels and empowers women who are genetically predisposed to breast cancer to make the best possible prevention decisions – these are just two examples of the recipients of the 2016 Council of Ontario University Programs in Nursing (COUPN) awards for excellence in nursing.

Each year, COUPN celebrates achievements in university nursing education through its annual <u>COUPN Awards program</u>. In all, eight awards of excellence will be presented to students, nursing faculty and staff during a ceremony tonight at the Chestnut Residence and Conference Centre in Toronto.

"We are proud to recognize the outstanding achievements of this year's Council of Ontario University Programs in Nursing award winners – some of Ontario's finest nurse educators, scholars, and students," says Michelle Cyr, Director of the Office of Health Sciences at the Council of Ontario Universities (COU).

"These individuals exemplify the far-reaching impact of baccalaureate and graduate nursing programs in Ontario, whether it is through innovative teaching that educates students for the workforce, groundbreaking research that leads to improvements in care for Ontario's patients, or exemplary clinical education in partnership with placement agencies like hospitals, long-term care homes and community nursing organizations."

The awards, which were created in 2008, focus on four key areas: excellence in teaching, innovation in research, student excellence and partnership support.
