The Lawrence S. Bloomberg Faculty of Nursing at the University of Toronto invites applications for up to two full time tenure-stream positions in the fields of either health informatics or care of the frail older adult at the rank of Assistant Professor to begin on July 1, 2018.

Excellence in teaching should be demonstrable in the submitted teaching statement, dossier of prior teaching experience, strong course evaluations, and strong letters of reference affirming the candidate's teaching accomplishments. The ideal candidate will have a strong record of scholarly activity, an emerging national/international reputation in research, a program of research closely related to either health informatics or care of the frail older adult, and evidence of continuing academic achievement and contribution to the field. Excellence in research should be evidenced by publications in top-ranked and field relevant journals or forthcoming publications meeting high international standards; awards and accolades; presentations at conferences; competitive research funding as a co- or principal investigator; as well as strong endorsements from referees of high standing.

Applicants whose research involves significant clinical or practice engagement are strongly encouraged. Candidates will hold at least a Masters degree in nursing and a PhD in nursing or related discipline by date of appointment or shortly thereafter. Postdoctoral or equivalent experience is required. All applicants must be eligible for registration with the College of Nurses of Ontario.

Salary will be commensurate with qualifications and experience.
