## School of Nursing, Faculty of Health Professorial Stream Appointments

The School of Nursing, Faculty of Health, York University invites highly qualified candidates to apply for a professorial stream tenure-track appointment in **Indigenous Health**, **History**, **and Healing Practices** at the Assistant, Associate or Full Professor level to commence July 1, 2021. Salary will be commensurate with qualifications and experience. All York University positions are subject to budgetary approval.

The successful candidate will join one of Canada's largest, most comprehensive, top ranked, research focused Schools of Nursing in Canada. The School currently offers three pathways toward a Bachelors degree in Nursing (second entry, direct entry, internationally educated), as well as a Masters in Nursing, a Masters for preparation as a Nurse Practitioner, and a PhD in Nursing. The School is in the midst of significant growth and renewal and enjoys partnerships with world leading healthcare institutions in both Ontario and around the world.

Candidates must (1) be registered in good standing or eligible for registration with the College of Nurses of Ontario; (2) have a baccalaureate degree in Nursing; (3) have a Master's degree in Nursing or a related field (Nursing preferred), and (4) have a PhD (or PhD near completion at the time of the appointment) in Nursing or other relevant area (Nursing preferred).

Recognizing the underrepresentation of Aboriginal (Indigenous) faculty, this opportunity is part of the University's Affirmative Action program that has been developed based on the special program provisions of the Ontario Human Rights Code.

We seek an Aboriginal (Indigenous) candidate with a research program related to the health and well-being of Indigenous populations whose scholarship recognizes the intersections of Indigeneity, health equity, and social determinants of health. Our school recognizes equity, diversity, inclusion, and decolonisation as central themes to the curriculum. The school recognizes the need to teach and develop future advocates for the use of Indigenous health knowledges and healing practices that collaborate with Indigenous Elders, healers, and knowledge keepers consistent with the Calls to Action of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada. The successful applicant will integrate their understanding of the plurality of Indigenous knowledges and worldviews to inform and provide students with learning opportunities in the undergraduate and graduate programs, including graduate student supervision. The successful candidate should demonstrate experience in decolonizing education, conflict resolution, human rights, and/or anti-racism.

The successful candidate will be expected to engage in and produce outstanding, innovative, and, as appropriate, externally funded research at the highest level.

Candidates must provide evidence of research excellence or promise of research excellence of a recognized international calibre as demonstrated in: the research statement; a record of publications (or forthcoming publications) with significant journals in the field; presentations at major conferences; awards and accolades; other culturally appropriate research and knowledge translation activities, and strong recommendations from referees of high standing.

The position will involve graduate teaching and supervision, as well as undergraduate teaching and the successful candidate must be suitable for prompt appointment to the Faculty of Graduate Studies.

Evidence of excellence or promise of excellence in teaching will be provided through: the teaching statement; teaching accomplishments and pedagogical innovations including in high priority areas such as experiential education and technology enhanced learning; teaching evaluations; and strong letters of reference.

York University acknowledges its presence on the traditional territory of many Indigenous Nations. Our university is committed to providing an inviting, rich and supportive work, study and research environment to its Indigenous students and Faculty members, not just through the allyship of its current faculty members, but also through structures such as the *York University's Centre for Aboriginal Student Services (CASS)* and the newly formed *Centre for Indigenous Knowledges and Languages*, which are guided by *The Indigenous Framework for York University: A Guide to Action*. signed letters of reference (at least one addressing community engagement with Indigenous communities and Peoples); a philosophy of teaching statement; teaching evaluations (if available); and a 5-year research plan including grant funding strategies.
