The candidate is expected to become an active and engaged member of the School, Faculty and University. Activities at local, national and international levels are expected to promote continuous improvement in teaching and learning at Dalhousie. There is no expectation of a research workload associated with this position.

Applicants must include a cover letter stating qualifications and experience, community engagement and /or lived experience in relation to EDI; a Curriculum Vitae; a statement of teaching experience and interests. If available, include a teaching dossier, and copies of teaching evaluations.
